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OVERVIEW

The staff, advisory board, affiliate faculty and volunteers at the University of Denver Prison Arts Initiative (DU PAI)are excited to share with you the outcomes of our second year of programming in partnership with the Colorado Department of Corrections (CDOC). Through this deepening relationship, we continue to offer high-quality programming to hundreds of incarcerated learners across Colorado.

Despite the many challenges of our prolonged pandemic moment, including weeks of lockdown and modified operations within the CDOC, our incarcerated students showed us and each other nothing less than profound resiliency and creative abundance. With their commitment to arts-based community, DU PAI with the CDOC, was able to push further our collective creative boundaries and goals.

To ensure the creative health of our inside and outside communities, DU PAI established LuxLit Press, a publishing house led by editors from Sterling Correctional Facility; multiple virtual arts-based offerings; the unprecedented event A/Live Inside: A Virtual Showcase of Artists and Their Stories from Colorado's Prisons; and other creativity-based rehabilitation practices.

We remain humbled by our supporters—the staff and leadership of the CDOC; DU's College of Arts, Humanities & Social Sciences; community partners; interns; but mostly by our incarcerated students.

INITIATIVES

JULY - AUGUST 2020

DU PAI staff grew exponentially during our second year of CDOC partnership. Among other additions, we hired four previously incarcerated individuals to the DU PAI staff, including Jamiylah Nelson, who along with DU PAI Co-Founder Apryl Alexander and DU PAI Director of Research, Shannon Sliva, was on DU's webinar panel: "From Criminalization to Community: Re-Imagining Justice".

DU PAI awarded a prestigious Arts in Society grant for its daily arts practice journal Sojourn: The Search, which will be distributed to over 900 incarcerated individuals, as well as dozens of CDOC staff and outside community members.

"Imagining Worlds: Reading & Writing Plays," the first of three virtual arts-based workshops we offered inside as a response to the COVID-19 pandemic was launched. 137 students participated from nine CDOC facilities.

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SEPTEMBER 2020

Our CDOC statewide newspaper, *The Inside Report*, published Volume 1, Issue 3, circulating 1,000 copies to all 21 CDOC facilities.

Production meetings begin for what will become DU PAI's groundbreaking online event A/Live Inside, taking place in November to an international audience.

OCTOBER 2020

Planning continues for A/Live Inside. The showcase includes the following featured spots: inaugural art show and new partnership Chained Voices; With(in) podcast season two trailer; staged reading from the anthology Imagining Worlds; teaser for the interview-based play If Light Closed Its Eyes; invitation to participate in Sojourn: The Search daily journal; scenes from the play Antigone filmed at Limon Correctional Facility; 'Historical Moments' – interludes capturing the history of prison in America; poetry readings from the literary magazine Reverberations; and a mini-documentary of The Inside Report newspaper.

NOVEMBER 2020

After months of meetings and countless hours of rehearsals, A/Live Inside: A Virtual Showcase of Artists and Their Stories from Colorado's Prisons was broadcast live on YouTube, the DU PAI website, as well as on all televisions inside the CDOC. Over 2,000 people tuned in the night of the show. As of this writing, almost 12,000 people have watched A/Live Inside globally. The show included a roundtable discussion facilitated by Mary Clark, DU's Provost & Executive Vice Chancellor, and featured Dean Williams, CDOC's Executive Director, Ashley Hamilton, DU PAI's Executive Director, and incarcerated speakers, performers and producers, Denise Presson, Travis Barnes, Michael J. Clifton, and Billy J. Edwards-El.

DECEMBER 2020

Evident Change announces the With(in) podcast Season 1, Episodes 1 and 2 has won a Media for a Just Society Award for Best Radio Show.

A/Live Inside was given a True West Award presented by the Arvada Center.

On December 16, Sojourn: The Search - A Daily Journal from the University of Denver's Prison Arts Initiative was published. Readers may purchase copies on Amazon or download a PDF for free on the DU PAI website. Also published was Imagining Worlds: An Anthology of Plays by Artists from Colorado's Prisons, the culminating project from the virtual course "Imagining Worlds: Reading & Writing Plays."

JANUARY 2021

Online galleries for the Chained Voices art show, featuring 400 pieces of art from 17 CDOC facilities, closed January 7. Almost \$10,000 worth of artwork was sold, the money from each purchase being sent to the individual contributing artists.

"The Walls Came Down: A Mixed-Methods Multi-Site Prison Arts Program Evaluation" was published in the *Justice Evaluation Journal* by DU PAI research team members Shannon Sliva and Danielle Littman.

Our second COVID-19 response arts-based workshop, "Tell It Slant: Reading & Writing Creative Nonfiction" was offered. 184 students from 10 CDOC facilities participated.

FEBRUARY 2021

For our new publications of The Inside Report newspaper, Reverberations literary magazine, anthologies, and journals, LuxLit Press was founded. The new literary wing of DU PAI is headed by an editorial team residing in Sterling Correctional Facility.

DU's Center for Community Engagement to advance Scholarship and Learning awarded DU PAI a Public Good Fund Bridge Grant for the supporting documentary of our production *If Light Closed Its Eyes*.

MARCH 2021

DU PAI staff and our GSSW intern, Nicholle Harris, along with professional photographer, Salvador Armendariz, co-lead our first reentry workshop, "Photography & Community." This four-week course helps returning citizens explore their self and surroundings.

Creative Producer, Ryan Conarro, assembled team for **new CDOC statewide radio station—Inside Wire**: **Colorado Prison Radio**. Inside Wire awarded a Creative Arts Material Funds grant and is also selected to be a part of DU's crowdfunding day 1Day4DU.

"Learning to See Through Drawing," our third and final virtual arts-based course we conducted in response to COVID-19, took place in 11 CDOC facilities with 201 participants. A mural of "Learning to See Through Drawing" exercises were showcased at the DU Community Commons Gallery in the fall.

APRIL 2021

DU PAI's program team, Julie Rada and Tess Neel, sent art call-outs and media release packets for the 2021 Chained Voices art show, taking place in August.

A virtual reading of selections from the course, "Tell It Slant: Reading & Writing Creative Nonfiction," was performed and recorded by "Tell It Slant" facilitators, responders and graders. The reading was broadcast on the CDOC's education channel.

MAY 2021

Out of 34 **1DAY4DU** sponsored projects, **DU PAI's 'Inside Wire'** came in 3rd place for number of donors at 126. Only 'DU Law' and '5280 Together Athletics COVID Relief Fund' received more individual donations. Inside Wire raised almost \$10,000.

DU PAI's inaugural Inside Out College Course, "Restorative Justice & Performance" wraps up. This class, co-taught by Ashley Hamilton, Shannon Sliva, and Joan Dieter, DU PAI's program coordinator, included 10 DU students and 10 incarcerated learners from Buena Vista Correctional Facility.

JUNE 2021

Eight performers residing in La Vista Women's Correctional Facility gave a reading from their new play "Universe Within" in front of a live audience. This project, to be performed in full in March 2022, is inspired by Sojourn: The Search.

"Learning to See Through Drawing" concludes. The course introduced students to the drawing concepts of contour lines, line weight, value, contrast, gradation, perspective, color theory and more.

EVALUATION

A/Live Inside Shifts the Conversation about Prison

We asked those who tuned in to DU PAI's A/Live Inside 3-hour virtual event several questions before and after, including how close they felt to incarcerated people and experiences of incarceration, their attitudes towards incarceration, and whether they intended to take action in some way around issues of incarceration. 142 people took our survey both before and after the event. After attending A/Live Inside, attendees felt significantly closer to incarcerated people. Those who felt closer were also more likely to say they had changed their views on incarceration - namely, that it was less necessary and more harmful than they had thought before and reported increased desire to act on issues of incarceration. These changes were felt most keenly among attendees who have never been inside prison before, suggesting that virtual prison arts events can be a vehicle for connection and catalyst for change among the general public.





TELL IT SLANT

The DU Prison Arts Initiative collected and analyzed feedback from the participants in the Tell It Slant workshop, which was conducted via correspondence during Winter 2021. When asked what the course was like for them overall, participants shared that they felt a sense of connection amidst an isolating time, like they could creatively express themselves, and experienced personal growth. When asked what stuck with them from the course, participants said they found their artistic voice, gained confidence, and developed new skills.

It's okay to be me.

I really enjoyed the variety of techniques I learned and the ability to receive feedback on my own application of the techniques. It provide[d] an outlet that was really needed and appreciated during all this isolation.
